John 9:1-41 ... A paraphrase

As Jesus and his disciples walked along, they saw a man who had been blind all his life. The disciples asked, "Rabbi, why was this man born blind, did he sin, or did his parents?" Jesus answered, "It was not because of anyone's sin, God's works of love will shine brightly in this person, as a sign to teach us. As long as it is day, we must do what the One who sent me asks of us. While I am in the world, I am light for the world."

After Jesus said this, he spat on the ground and made mud and spread the mud on the person's eyes saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which

means One who is Sent). The person went, washed off the mud and he could see.

The man's neighbours and other people who had seen him begging wondered if he really could be the same man and they argued about this. He told them, "I am that person!" "Then how can you see?" they asked. He answered. "Someone named Jesus made some mud and smeared it on my eyes. He then told me to go and wash it off in Siloam Pool. When I did this, I could see.

The day that Jesus made the mud and healed the person was the Sabbath. So some of the people took the person to the Pharisees. They asked the man, formally blind, how he was able to see, and he answered, "Jesus made some mud and smeared it on my eyes. Then after I washed it off, I could see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man Jesus doesn't come from God. If he did, he would not break the law of the Sabbath." Others asked, "How could someone who is a sinner work such a sign?" The person formerly blind exclaimed, "I don't know who is a sinner. All I know is that I used to be blind, but now I can see!"
